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With the new year, I would like to take this opportunity to say that I am proud of our town and the work we have accomplished as a community. I would also like to thank every employee, commission, and committee member for all the work they do for the town. The future is bright for the Town of Columbia,



and I look forward to continuing my service to the town as your First Selectman.

Highlighted below are some of the projects that were started in 2022 and completed and 2023. In addition, we've highlighted some 2023 projects, American Rescue Plan projects and important activities.

- Nine-hole disc golf course that weaves along the outside of Rec Park. The course is family friendly for both beginners and disc golf enthusiasts.
- The tennis court got a makeover expanding the size of the court, a new base and resurfacing, new tennis court lines and pickleball court lines, new posts, fencing, and netting.
- Two new pickleball courts were added to the refurbished tennis courts with moveable nets. The third pickleball court was completed by mid-summer.
- The Lions Club Pavilion at Rec Park received some much-needed sprucing up of the gables.
- We enjoyed the Summer Concert Series at Rec Park under the new pavilion with four great bands and food trucks.
- Important safety changes to state roads were completed to the intersection of Route 66 and Hunt/ West St. and the elimination of passing zone by the Main Moose on Route 66.
- Major road and culvert projects were completed for Erdoni Rd., Whitney Rd., and Hennequin Rd. Paving of portions of Cards Mill Road were completed.
- The Town of Columbia met the requirements of a designated HEARTSafe community. This designation recognizes our community's commitment to provide improved cardiac response and care to our community utilizing the "Chain of Survival" of early 9-1-1 access, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, defibrillation, and advanced care. A 24-hour access defibrillator was installed at Rec Park.
- The Town of Columbia Volunteer Fire Department (CVFD) was awarded through the Assistance to Firefighter Grant/FEMA \$136,000 grant for the purchase of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCUBA). This

equipment protects firefighters from toxic fumes. In addition, CVFD received an award of \$250,000 to go towards a new replacement for their 1989 forestry vehicle. This is important to improve our ability to protect our growing Mono Pond State Park.

• The Horace W. Porter School Indoor Air Quality Improvement Project was approved through referendum to provide complete design work for Indoor Air Quality System and related renovations and improvements for the Horace W. Porter School. The town has submitted for a state construction grant to help offset 52% of the approved project.

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) projects that were completed included:

- Construction of the Department of Public Works new office building. The building has a conference/ training room, DPW Director's office, and another work station area for a foreman. There is a breakroom, locker room with sinks, toilets and a shower and an ADA non-gendered restroom with a shower.
- Recreation Park saw the completion of the new pavilion, handicap bathrooms, storage for the Recreation Department, Little League, and Soccer League. As well as grading and milling of the parking lot, gate installation to prevent cars from going behind the concession stand, and the installation of guardrails in front of the girls' softball field.
- HVAC and exhaust system upgrade to Columbia Volunteer Fire Department building.
- HVAC Systems for the Town Hall and Murphy House.

In 2024 the projects that we are looking ahead to include:

- Newly launched Snow Removal Grant Pilot Program for seniors 55 and older or disabled that have an emergency need to have their driveway snowplowed and/or walkway cleared.
- Sixteen electric vehicle charging units have been installed in six locations in Columbia and will be completely up and running by February.
- Installation of new generator at the Beckish Senior Center.
- Boathouse and pavilion replacement will be completed.
- Installation of HVAC air and heat into Yeomans Hall.
- Upgrades to the bathrooms at the Murphy House at the Town Beach.

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Presidential Primary

- April 2, 2024 at Horace W. Porter School, 6–8pm
- Only voters registered in the party which is holding the Primary may vote. So only registered Republicans can vote in the Republican Primary and only registered Democrats can vote in the Democratic Primary.
- If you are not currently registered to vote, mail in registrations must be postmarked by March 15, 2024 or you can register in person until noon on April 1, 2024.
- If you are NOT currently affiliated with a political party (registered as Unaffiliated), you can enroll via mail. Registration cards must be received by March 15, 2024 or you can register in person until noon on April 1, 2024.

Homeowners program

The Homeowners program will start accepting applications again as of February 1, 2024. If you are already in the program, you will receive a letter from us reminding you to file. If you are not already in the program, you will need to bring a copy of your 1040 income tax forms for 2022 to our office once they are completed or all your income information if you do not file income taxes. We cannot accept paperwork before February 1st. If you have any questions, feel free to call us at 860-228-9555.





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Permanent absentee ballots

An elector with a permanent physical disability, who is unable to appear in person at their poll on Election Day, may file an absentee ballot application along with a doctor's certificate (on letterhead) with the Town Clerk. This will place the elector on the Permanent Absentee Ballot list. A copy will be forwarded to the Registrar of Voters so that the permanent status can be noted on their registration. Throughout the year, for any election, primary or referendum, the Town Clerk will automatically mail an absentee ballot to the elector as soon as they become available. Please contact our office if you have any questions.

Births • Deaths • Marriages

Certified copies of vital events such as births, deaths and marriages are available from the Town Clerk. A request application and positive identification are necessary to obtain a certified copy. There is a fee of \$20.00 for each certified copy requested.

Probate Court

Probate Court for Columbia is located in Manchester at 66 Center Street. Michael M. Darby is Probate Judge. If you have any questions, you can call their office at 860-647-3227, Monday thru Friday from 8:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

Dogs

If you are new to Columbia and have not registered your dog with us or you have a new dog that is at least six months of age, please contact our office. You will need an updated rabies vaccination certificate and a spayed/ neutered certificate, if applicable, to license your dog.

Fishing and hunting

Sports licenses for 2024 are available for purchase in the Town Clerk's office and on the DEEP website. The DEEP invites you to go to their website https://portal.ct.gov/ DEEP-CT-Outdoor-Guides for downloadable PDFs of their fishing and hunting guides.

The Town Clerk's office is fully open to the public. We are here for those services you might need – Recording and Searching of Land Records, Certified copies of Vital Records, Marriage licenses, Dog Licenses, Transfer Station stickers, Fishing and Hunting licenses, etc.

When considering or starting new projects in your house or around your property, please remember to check with the Building & Land Use Department to see if there are any required permits.

If you decide to sell your home, potential buyers are more likely to get an approved mortgage when upgrades or improvements to the house or property have been accurately documented (permitted, inspected, and have been issued a certificate of approval/occupancy).

It is important to know what inspections are required and to follow up with your contractor (if using one) to

making sure inspections are scheduled as needed, especially the final inspection. It gives peace of mind knowing the work has been completed in accordance with State Building Codes. Keep in mind that permits having no activity for 6 months can expire and may have an additional permit fee if they are reactivated to proceed with and complete the project.





Midwinter Checkup

We are in the middle of the heating season, so now is a good time to do a safety check on all of your heating devices. All combustibles should be at least 36" away from any heating source. Chimneys, power vents, and make-up air systems must be clean and clear for proper operation. Smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors should be tested to make sure they are in working order. Any alarm or detector that is over ten years old should be replaced entirely. Lastly, all ash should be disposed of properly. Always ensure ash is extinguished and placed outside safely away from combustibles. Please feel free to contact the Land Use Department with any questions at 860-228-0440.

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Spring Will Bring Back Local Crops

While plenty of farms operate year-round, many are seasonal businesses that are only open to the public during the warmer months of the year. As winter slow-

ly melts into spring, it's a great time to think about planning for summer foods from our area farms. Several farms operate Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) programs, that provide affordable weekly access to high quality produce and meats through an up-front investment from the customer or member. This early investment in a small farm acknowledges the commitment that

farmers make to raise their crops, their work in keeping agriculture an active part of Columbia and the importance of healthy nutrient dense foods for our bodies. Farms with CSA programs will generally sell farmshares in the winter and spring, in advance of harvests and CSA distributions beginning in June.



The reward for this investment is a weekly share of what is harvested at that time of the year. The contents of that share change every week and is the beauty of a CSA program and eating locally. It is a wonderful way to learn about seasonality and how precious and delicious

> a green bean is in July, how a watermelon drips with sweetness in August, and how absolutely delicious carrots can be in November. Farms that produce meat have seasonal variations too. For many people that are new to local seasonal eating, the flavors are mind blowing!

> Farms in Columbia are supported by UConn Extension's Grown Con-

nected marketing campaign, dedicated to farms in the northeastern part of the state. You can find a list of our farms at www.grownconnected.org The Columbia Conservation and Agriculture Commission also works to highlight our town's farms and farmers, which plays a significant role in our history and our present.

In addition to providing our students and families with a welcoming environment and excellent education, H. W. Porter School places a strong emphasis on creating and maintaining a safe school environment. We were fortunate to welcome Joe Marsh as our first Armed School Security Officer to our school community at the beginning of the current school year. Mr. Marsh is a Columbia resident with deep connections to our town and school. Mr. Marsh is a retired State Trooper from the Connecticut State Police with more than twenty years of service. He worked at Troop K in Colchester that serves 12 towns, including Columbia.

As our School Security Officer Mr. Marsh monitors traffic at the beginning and end of each school day. During the school day he monitors the school grounds and address any safety concerns that may arise. Just as importantly, Mr. Marsh serves as a positive role model and helps to forge positive relationships with students and law enforcement officers. Mr. Marsh plays an important role in developing our school safety plans and assists with all school safety drills. Like most schools in Connecticut, Porter has a wide range of safety technology and practices including our locked exterior doors and the technology that *Continued on page* 13

860.228.4324 hvhct.com It has been a year since the Town acquired the 3.6-acre parcel on Hop River Road, now known as the Hop River Mills Preserve. With two hundred years of water-powered industrial use beginning in 1715, the site has many stories to tell. An ad from the Windham Herald of 1796 describes many of the activities present there in the 18th century, some of which included, "A Saw mill, grift mill, fulling mill, and iron works."

When the Town got the property, it was so overgrown that its remaining features were all but invisible. This stone headwall was one of the few items still showing above ground. After a year of work by a

number of volunteers, most of the vegetation has been removed revealing more above ground features, and readying the site for a GPR (Ground-Penetrating Radar)



survey to show what remains below the surface.

When the Town receives the GPR Survey report, the Hop River Mills Committee will begin to lay out plans for the next year - some archaeological work to reveal the footprint of the old mills, a start on a trail with interpretive signage to guide visitors through the site, and preparation of areas for passive recreation activities such as fishing and picnicking.

allows us to control entrance into the building and cameras and communications devices that allow us to monitor and address any potential safety challenges in the building. However, we have heard from many members of the school community how reassuring it is to always have an Armed School Security Officer present during school hours to enhance the safety of our students and staff members.

Beginning in January, Paul Calafiore, a retired State Trooper from the Bureau of Criminal Investigations and an officer Mohegan Tribal Police will be joining Porter. This will allow Mr. Marsh and Mr. Calafiore to each serve as parttime armed school security officers ensuring that we always have one officer on duty each day school is in session.

Required documentation includes gross income (or current Energy Assistance approval), proof of age or disability, completion of the application and release, and invoice from a vendor with a W-9. Household must be willing to share why the service was needed as part of the application.

Heating Assistance

The State of CT Energy Assistance Program: Applications for the 2023-24 energy assistance program are underway. This program is available regardless of heating source. Gross income cannot exceed \$41,553/year (single) and \$54,338 (couples). There is no asset limit. Documentation needed: last four weeks of gross income and utility bills, as proof of rent/mortgage. If you are receiving cash assistance or SNAP you can provide benefit documentation instead of proof of income. If you are new to the program DSS requires your Identification and Social Security cards for everyone in the household as well as income and utility bills. Operation Fuel: Operation Fuel is targeting a start date of January 8, 2024 to begin accepting applications for assistance with utilities or heat. Historically, Operation Fuel have also assisted households that may be slightly over income for Energy Assistance. 
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
