At the time of this publication, Indigenous Peoples Day (Monday,

October 9th) will have already passed, but this day provides the opportunity to build our knowledge of Indigenous groups in our area. Indigenous Peoples Day celebrates and honors indigenous American peoples and commemorates their histories and cultures. In Columbia, we share an important history with the Mohegans and their neighbors, the Mashantucket Pequot, Eastern Pequot, Schaghticoke, Golden Hill Paugusett, Nipmuc, and Lenape peoples.

Columbia presented "Columbia's Recognition of its First Peoples" in a dedication of the Samson Occom Memorial Garden in 2022. The recognition follows in its entirety.

The significance of the garden exemplifies Mohegan Samson Occom's efforts to bring both worlds together though his writing and education.

Samson Occom (1723-1792) became a Christian convert and studied under the Reverend Eleazar Wheelock in his "Lattin School" here in Columbia from 1743 to 1747. Occom's achievements became the inspiration for Wheelock's founding of Moor's Indian Charity School in 1754, which aimed to educate Native American youth to become missionaries to their people.

In addition to his work as a Presbyterian minister, Reverend Occom used the English-style education he had received to become an advocate for Native American education and rights. Through his preaching and writings, he sought to bridge the wide gap between the very different English and Native cultures.

#### Columbia's Recognition of its First **Peoples**

"We stand together on lands which Sachem Uncas and his family used as a hunting and fishing preserve. These lands in Eastern Connecticut that encompass Columbia and neighboring towns were stewarded by Mohegan ancestors. We also rec-

ognize that our town has a highway that transects these lands, an Indigenous pathway connecting Connecticut's shore communities to the Connecticut tidal river in the northwest, used by Mohegans and their neighbors, the Mashantucket Pequot, Eastern Pequot, Schaghticoke, Golden Hill Paugusett, Nipmuc, and Lenape peoples. It registered the footsteps of the 90 or so Native students, boys and girls, from 11 tribes from eastern North America who came here to attend Moor's Charity School from 1755 - 1770." 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Town of Columbia

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Columbia has been very blessed by the generous grants given to us through Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and through the Assistance to Firefighter Grants (AFG) program. These grants aim to enhance the safety of the public and firefighters with respect to fire-related hazards by providing direct financial assistance to our department. These grants help fire departments obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training, and oth-

er resources needed to protect the public and emergency personnel.

This summer U.S. Senator Richard Blumenthal came to Columbia to announce a \$136,000 grant for the Columbia Volunteer Fire Department that allowed the purchase of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCUBA). This equipment protects fire fighters from toxic fumes.

On another good note, Senator Cathy Osten and Representative Tim Ackert just announced a grant award of \$250,000 to go towards a new replacement for our 1989 forestry vehicle. With the expansion of the Mono Pond State Forest to a new total of 600 acres we will be better prepared to respond to all kinds of emergencies from forest fires to lost or injured hikers.





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#### **Municipal Elections**

Municipal elections will take place on November 7, 2023. Absentee ballots become available on October 6, 2023 through the close of business on November 6, 2023.



#### Absentee Ballots

An elector with a permanent physical disability, who is unable to appear in person at their poll on Election Day, may file an absentee ballot application along with a doctor's certificate (on letterhead) with the Town Clerk. This will place the elector on the Permanent Absentee Ballot list. A copy will be forwarded to the Registrar of Voters so that the permanent status can be noted on their registration. Throughout the year, for any election, primary or referendum, the Town Clerk will automatically mail an absentee ballot to the elector as soon as they become available. #### TAX OFFICE

Don't forget!! The second installment of the Real Estate, Personal Property and the Supplemental Motor Vehicle taxes will become due on January 1, 2024. The last day to pay without a penalty is February 1, 2024.

Bills are not sent for the second installment, please put a reminder on your calendar!

Please feel free to leave payments or correspondence in the drop box at the right side of the entrance of the Town Hall or in the drop box in front of Yeoman's Hall. The drop boxes are emptied at 8:00AM each weekday; weekend tax payments are processed on Monday. Please be aware that tax payments put in the drop box after 8:00AM will be processed the next day the Tax Office is open (see hours below).

Regular office hours for the Tax Office: Monday through Wednesday 8:00-2:00, Thursday 10:00-6:00 and closed on Friday.

The Tax Office has extended hours in the month of January and February 1, 2024: Monday through Wednesday 8:00-4:00, Thursday 10:00-6:00 and Friday 8:00-12:00.

- The search criteria will need to be entered exactly how the tax bill is written. Enter the last name, a space, and then the first initial of the first name.

You can also utilize this site during income tax time to look up your payment history. Locate your bill using the instructions above, then hover over the icons in the option column and click on the one that says tax payment history. You will also find written instructions on the pay taxes online page. #### Preschool Screenings

The Early Childhood Team of Horace W. Porter School is pleased to announce that we will conduct Preschool Screenings for Columbia 2-year and 9-month-old (turning 3 by December 31, 2023) and any 4-year-old not previously screened (and not turning 5 by December 31, 2023). Please call Deborah Dupuis at (860) 228-0585 if you would like your child to be screened. All public-school systems in Connecticut are responsible for the identification of children who may be eligible to receive special education services. The early childhood team in Columbia offers preschool developmental screenings for current resident children. The purpose of this screening is to collect information about each preschooler's early development in the areas of cognition, communication, motor functioning, and social interaction. This will help us to determine whether your child needs any special services in order to prepare for school success. #### Absentee Ballots:

- Absentee Ballots are available now through close of business on November 6th. To obtain an Absentee Ballot, you must first fill out an application. You can find an application on the Registrars of Voters website, or contact the Town Clerk at (860) 228-3284.
- Completed Absentee Ballots must be received by 8pm on November 7th. They can be returned via mail, Ballot Drop Box outside Town Hall, or to the Town Clerk's office. Absentee Ballots cannot be accepted at the polling place.

#### **Permits**

If you have taken a building permit out from 10/1/2022 to 9/30/2023, please send pictures with a paper stating the date on it, to show that either the work has not been performed, or at what status the work currently is. This includes work that was COD. Please submit pictures to mhawley@columbiact.org by November 1, 2023. This is in lieu of physical inspection. If you prefer a visit just email me and we can schedule a date and time. Please be patient with my reply as I am inundated with responses this time of year. I will reply.

#### **Personal Property**

This notice is to remind all taxpayers who file a declaration for personal property to please do so no later than November 1st annually. If not filed in a timely manner, per state statute a 25% penalty shall be applied. If you own a business or have unregistered motor vehicle(s) that are not currently on our list, please let us know and we will email, fax or mail you a declaration.

#### **Property Tax Exemption** for Farm Buildings

A new property tax exemption for farm buildings was adopted on September 29, 2023 and will become effective October 20. Applications can be filed from October 20, through November 1. The exemption is as follows:

#### Section 1. Title

This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "An Ordinance Providing a Property Tax Exemption for Farm Buildings."

#### Section 2. Legislative Authority.

This Ordinance is enacted pursuant to the provisions of Section 12-91(c) of the Connecticut General Statutes, as it may be amended from time-to-time.

#### Section 3. Findings and Purpose.

The Town of Columbia finds that the preservation of farming and farmland is vitally important to retaining Columbia's rural character and quality of life, as well as promoting economic and environmental sustainability. Therefore, pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes § 12-91(c), as amended, the Town of Columbia seeks to protect, preserve and promote the health, welfare and quality of life of its people by providing a tax exemption for certain farm buildings.

#### Section 4. Applicability and Benefits.

- (a) For a farmer who qualifies for the farm machinery exemption under Connecticut General Statutes § 12-91(a), any building used actually and exclusively in farming, as "farming" is defined in Section 1-1 of the Connecticut General Statutes, including for any building used to provide housing for seasonal employees of such farmer, upon proper application being made in accordance with this section, shall be exempt from property tax to the extent of an assessed value of one hundred thousand dollars.
- (b) This exemption shall not apply to any residence of any farmer.
- (c) Annually, within thirty days after the assessment date, each individual farmer, group of farmers, partnership or corporation shall make written application to the Assessor for the exemption provided in subsection (a) of this section, including therewith a notarized affidavit certifying that such farmer, individually or as part of a group, partnership or corporation, derived at least fifteen thousand dollars in gross sales from such farming operation or incurred at least fifteen thousand dollars in expenses related to such farming operation, with respect to the most recently completed taxable year of such farmer prior to the commencement of the assessment year for which such application is made, on forms prescribed by the Commissioner of Agriculture. The farmer should be prepared to provide the assessor with proof of farm income and expenditures such as an Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Schedule F (form 1040) and or profit and loss statement from farming. Failure to file such application in said manner and form within the time limit prescribed shall be considered a waiver of the right to such exemption for the assessment year. Any person aggrieved by any action of the Assessor shall have the rights and remedies for appeal and relief as are provided in the general statutes for taxpayers claiming to be aggrieved by the doings of the Assessor.

#### Heating Assistance

With the winter season approaching, a reminder that there are resources for heating assistance:

The State of CT Energy Assistance Program: Applications for the 2023-24 energy assistance program are underway. This program is available regardless of heating source. Gross income cannot exceed \$41,553/ year (single) and \$54,338 (couples). There is no asset limit. Documentation needed: last four weeks of gross income and utility bills, as proof of rent/mortgage. If you are receiving cash assistance or SNAP you can provide benefit documentation instead of proof of income. If you are new to the program DSS requires your Identification and Social Security cards for everyone in the household as well as income and utility bills.



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If you weren't at the Heartstone Winery on August 17th, you missed a great party! Columbia Open Space Committee held a fundraiser for the Trust for Public Land (TPL), the non-profit that has been helping Columbia conserve additional forest in the Wells Woods section of Mono Pond State Park.

In recent years, through the combined efforts of the Town of Columbia, TPL, and the State of CT, we have added 600 acres of the 1000-acre goal. Trust for Public Land and a Trails Grant from the State of CT will fund a master plan for multi-use trails for the public to enjoy.

Trust for Public Land is a national non-profit land trust that aids municipalities, land trusts, and national parks to conserve land. TPL's motto, "Land for People," says it all. TPL owns no land: they help conserve Open Space by providing funding and professional expertise, and then turn the land over to the people.

Currently, TPL is working with the State of CT to fund and develop a master multi-use trail system in Mono Pond State Park, including the Town-owned land in Wells Woods. This will provide trails for hiking, equestrian use, as well as mountain biking, and bow hunting, while protecting the sensitive wildlife areas. The trail system will connect to the Airline State Park.

Trust for Public Land provides, without cost, the expertise most municipalities lack to conserve land: Land use lawyers, appraisers, land surveyors, mapping experts, trail planners, and negotiators. Their funding comes from donations from the public, charitable foundations, grants, and partnerships.

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

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
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
