OFFICE OF THE FIRST SELECTMAN & TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

Several key projects were completed in 2022 significantly contributing to the growth and quality of our Town. Additionally, some projects were started in 2022 and are well on their way to completion in 2023. Projects of note include:

Safety Changes to State Roads through Columbia – The Board of Selectmen approved important safety changes to the intersection of Route 66 and Hunt/West St. Connecticut Department of Transportation (ConnDOT) installed new opposing left turn lanes. The existing conditions cause sight-line blockage when two opposing left-turning vehicles on Route 66 are stopped at this intersection, leading to high-speed collisions with oncoming traffic. The left turn lanes will now align left turning vehicles so that each direction can see oncoming traffic, resulting in safer traffic operation.

Elimination of Passing Zone by the Main Moose on Route 66: A request was sent from the Town to ConnDOT to eliminate a dangerous passing zone in front of the Main Moose on Route 66. During ConnDOT's repaving project on Route 6 & 66 they agreed to take out the dangerous passing zone.

Erdoni Road Culvert Repair Project: The Department of Public Works repaired twin culverts on Erdoni Road. The project included excavation, mortaring the head walls, adding hydraulic cement to fill to top of road, and adding asphalt to complete road repair. The road repair took less than a week and was all done in-house providing significant savings to the town.

Cards Mill Road Improvement Project: Portions of Cards Mill Road from Route 66 to the intersection of Baker Hill Road were milled and paved.

Construction of Department of Public Works Office Building: The Board of Selectmen granted approval for the construction of the DPW office building and all associated work and site improvements. Construction will start in early 2023. The building will have a conference/training room, DPW Director's office, and another work station area for a foreman. There will be a breakroom, locker room with sinks, toilets and a shower and an ADA non-gendered restroom with a shower. The multi-purpose office will provide our dedicated DPW crew the ability to conduct vital functions as well as modernize the current office amenities that are in place. This project was funded through the American Rescue Plan Funds.

Recreation Park: The following Recreation Park projects were completed.

- New pavilion construction completed with concession stand, handicap bathrooms, and storage for the Recreation Department, Little League, and the Soccer League.
- Grading and milling of parking lot.
- Gate installed to prevent cars from going behind the concession stand.
- Guardrail installation project in front of the girls' softball field.
- Maintenance Garage was completed which houses all the grounds maintenance equipment.

All the above projects with the exception of the Maintenance Garage were funded through the American Rescue Plan Funds.

Columbia Volunteer Fire Department Upgrade to Mobile and Portable Radios and Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) Phone System: The upgrade to the mobile and portable radios will provide improved communications for the Department of Public works, Emergency Management, Columbia Volunteer Fire Department (CVFD), and the State Police. The upgrade was funded with the American Rescue Plan Funds.

The CVFD is also upgrading the old phone system to a Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) Phone System. Improving the audio-visual training equipment will provide better communication with agencies during major storm events and allow volunteers to conduct their training remotely. The VoIP system was also funded with American Rescue Plan Funds.

HVAC and Exhaust System Upgrade to CVFD Building: The CVFD has received the necessary exhaust system upgrades to better vent the fire and ambulance bays. Four HVAC heating and cooling units and being installed this month. This project was funded by the American Rescue Plan Funds.

Permittink Permitting Software: Permittink is a cloud-based permitting software that provides residents with an efficient and convenient way to remotely submit permits to the building department and the health district.

HVAC Systems for the Town Hall and Murphy House: Installation of HVAC systems at the Town Hall and the Murphy House (located at the beach) were completed. These projects were funded by the American Rescue Plan Funds.

Community Social Services "The More you Know" series: Columbia Social Services Senior implemented "The More you Know" program series in June. This wellness series aims to educate, connect, and support our community's mental and physical health.

Revaluation: A full revaluation for Grant List 2021 billable in July 2022 for taxes, resulting in a reduced Mil Rate from 29.33% to 25.87%

Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Stations: Eversource and United Illuminating, as well as funds available as part of the US settlement with Volkswagen will be provide grant funding for Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Stations. Eversource grant funding has been approved. Eversource will contribute approximately \$20,000 for the EV charging stations at each site. The town is waiting to hear from the Volkswagen settlement funding to see if that has been approved. EV charging stations upon approval of the Board of Selectmen may be placed at the Town of Columbia Parks and Recreation building, the Beckish Senior Center, Columbia Town Hall, Horace W. Porter School, the Saxton B. Little Free Library, and the Department of Public Works garage.

History Place Masonry Repairs: The History Place received important masonry repairs to maintain the safety and integrity of the building.

Beckish Senior Center Programs: Digital Literacy Program and R U Ok Program - The Beckish Senior Center started the Digital Literacy Program in February 2022 with a generous donation from Spectrum Communications. Spectrum donated 10 Chrome books to the Beckish Senior Center to be used for the digital literacy program.

The R U OK Program is a free service that the town provides establishing a prearranged time for participants to receive a regular phone call inquiring about their welfare. During the call participants are asked "Are You OK?" If they answer "yes" they may simply hang up and continue with their day. If a concern is expressed, the volunteer caller will determine the nature of the concern and if some sort of response is necessary. Unanswered calls or busy signals are called back. If there is still no response after multiple tries, the volunteer caller may request that an officer be dispatched to the location for a safety check.

What we have done this past year reflects the hard work from all our elected officials, volunteers, and town departments that provide exceptional service to Columbia and its residents.

FY 23/24 BUDGET SEASON: Now begins the time and commitment of our Board of Selectmen, Board of Education and Financial Planning and Allocation Commission working with our employees to prepare a budget to present in our public meetings. Budget presentations by the Superintendent of the Horace W. Porter School and the Town Administrator to the Financial Planning and Allocation Commission (FiPAC) will be held on 3/15/23 at 7:00 PM. FiPAC will have a budget workshops on 3/22/23 and 3/29/23, 4/5/23 (tentative), 4/12/23 (tentative) at their scheduled Special Meeting. The Public Hearing on the budget with a FiPAC Special Meeting to follow will be held on 4/26/23.

The Annual Town Budget Meeting will be called by the Board of Selectmen per the Charter between the 2nd Tuesday of May and the 1st Tuesday of June. The date of the Annual Town Budget Meeting will be posted on the town's website at www.columbiact.org and at the Town Clerk's Office.

SOCIAL SERVICES:

Mobile Foodshare: Mobile Foodshare provides an opportunity to receive perishable food. Food varies depending on the supply, but can include things like fresh fruits and fresh vegetables. You do not need to show any ID. There is not income eligibility test and you can attend any location. Mobile Foodshare comes to the Columbia Senior Center twice a month as well as other location throughout the state. For a schedule and locations see below. If you have questions about the Columbia location please contact me at 860-228-1008.



For Columbia residents in need of non-perishables and to check availability of toiletries, please contact me to access the Town of Columbia Food Bank.

Energy Assistance: Help with heating costs is available for qualified renters and homeowners who heat with deliverables (oil, propane, wood) or utilities (gas or electric) through the state of CT Energy Assistance program. Annual Gross Income must be under: \$39,761 for a household of 1, \$51,996 For a household of 2, \$64,230 household of 3, \$76,465 household of 4, \$88,699 household of 5, \$100,933 household of 6.

There is no asset test for this program! Proof of the last four weeks of income and utility bills are required. First time applicants must submit proof of social security cards. To apply through Columbia Social Services, contact Katie Wilt at 860- 228-1008 for an appointment. Applicants can also apply online or through ACCESS (860-450- 7400). Applications can be downloaded Or, contact Katie Wilt at 860-228-1008 for an application. Applications are currently being accepted. The deadline to apply is May 31,2023.

If you are having issues with your application being processed, please reach out to me for support.

Operation Fuel: Operation Fuel provides emergency energy and utility assistance to households in CT that are facing financial crisis. Income-eligible applicants can receive a one-time grant if experiencing a crisis situation. Applicants can be submitted online with directly Operation Fuel, by phone at 860-243-2345, and or making an appointment at WAIM (860-456-7270, ext 12).

(Potential applicants are encouraged to utilize the <u>state Energy Assistance Program</u> first if possible.)

Around Town: On a recent Saturday in January, Rec Park was alive with runners for a Cold Snap run to help raise funds for the Hole in the Wall Camp.


