



PARTY TRANSFER DEADLINE FOR PRIMARY IS JANUARY 2, 2024

Primaries in CT are "Closed Primaries", meaning that only voters registered in the party which is holding the Primary may vote. So, only registered Republicans can vote in the Republican Primary and only registered Democrats can vote in the Democratic Primary. The deadline to transfer registration from one party to another and be eligible to vote in the Primary of the new party (Democratic or Republican) is **JANUARY 2, 2024.** This deadline also applies if you are currently registered in a minor party (Independent, Green Party, Libertarian, etc).

SOCIAL SERVICES:

TOWN OF COLUMBIA FOOD BANK: For Columbia residents in need of non-perishables and to check availability of toiletries, please contact Katie Wilt at 860-228-1008 to make an appointment.

SNOW REMOVAL GRANT PILOT PROGRAM: If you are a Columbia resident who is a senior 55+ or disabled and have an emergency where you needed to get your driveway and or walkway snow plowed and are having trouble paying the bill please contact Columbia Social Services at 860-228-1008 or kwilt@columbiact.org to apply to the Pilot Snow Removal Grant Program.

Income eligibility is 60% of CT's state median income (household of 1 is \$41,553 and household of 2 is \$54,338)

Required documentation includes gross income (or current Energy Assistance approval), proof of age or disability, completion of the application and release, and invoice from a vendor with a W-9. Household must be willing to share why the service was needed as part of the application.

HEATING ASSISTANCE: The State of CT Energy Assistance Program: Applications for the 2023-24 energy assistance program are underway. This program is available regardless of heating source. Gross income cannot exceed \$41,553/year (single) and \$54,338 (couples). There is no asset limit. Documentation needed: last four weeks of gross income and utility bills, as proof of rent/mortgage. If you are receiving cash assistance or SNAP you can provide benefit documentation instead of proof of income. If you are new to the program DSS requires your Identification and Social Security cards for everyone in the household as well as income and utility bills.

TAX OFFICE: Do not forget! The second installment of the Real Estate, Personal Property and the Supplemental Motor Vehicle taxes will become due on January 1, 2024. The last day to pay without a penalty is February 1, 2024. If taxes are not paid on or before February 1, 2024 interest will be charged at the rate of 1½% per month (18% per year) from the due date of January 1st. The minimum interest charge is \$2.00 (per vehicle). Failure to receive a bill does not invalidate the tax or interest per CT State Statute. Bills are not sent for this second installment, please put a reminder on your calendar!

Regular office hours for the TAX OFFICE: Monday through Wednesday 8:00-2:00, Thursday 10:00-6:00 and closed on Friday. In December town offices are closed on the 22nd, 25th, 29th and January 1st for the Holidays.

The Tax Office has extended hours during the tax collection month of January and February 1, 2024: Monday through Wednesday 8:00-4:00, Thursday 10:00-6:00 and Friday 8:00-12:00.

Drop boxes for payments and correspondence are located at the right side of the entrance of the Town Hall and in front of Yeoman's Hall. The drop boxes are emptied at 8:00AM each weekday, weekend tax payments are processed on Monday. Please be aware that tax payments put in the drop box after 8:00AM will be processed the next day the Tax Office is open.

You can view and pay taxes online. Service fees for tax payments are .95 cents to use a bank account and 2.99% for credit and debit cards.

To find your tax bills online:

- Go to <u>www.columbiact.org</u> on the home page click on the pay taxes online tab.
- On the next page click on to view/pay tax bills.
- The search criteria will need to be entered exactly how the tax bill is written. last name, space, and your first initial.

TAX OFFICE (CONTINUED): You can also utilize this site to look up your payment history. Locate your bill using the instructions above, then hover over the icons in the option column and select tax payment history. If you have any problems using the online system, please contact the Tax Office at 860-228-0230 or <u>taxcollector@columbiact.org</u> and we will gladly assist you.

For those seeking an immediate clearance for DMV due to delinquent taxes please contact the Tax Office at 860-228-0230 or <u>taxcollector@columbiact.org</u> for information on the process. Paying the tax bill online does not clear you immediately at DMV. You will need to contact the tax office during tax office hours for assistance.

FRIENDS OF MONO POND STATE PARK:

THE BEGINNING: Over the past few years, the State of Connecticut, with the help of the Towns of Columbia and Lebanon and the Trust for Public Land, has acquired several large parcels of land. These acquisitions have expanded the Mono Pond State Park from its pre-existing 200 acres to well over 600.



The property provides opportunities for hiking, biking, running, and horseback riding; skiing,

snowshoeing, and skating; and bow hunting, fishing, and kayaking, to name but a few! The property is also steeped in history, with foundations in the Mint Brook parcel dating back to the 18th century.

As Mono Pond State Park acreage expanded beyond Columbia's town boundaries, the potential benefit of having a similarly expansive alliance of individuals sharing an appreciation of this resource was recognized. In an effort to build such an alliance, in 2022, the Friends of Mono Pond State Park (FOMPSP) was formed. We are an all volunteer nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization created to enhance and support conservation, recreation and educational activities within Mono Pond State Park, while preserving the integrity of the park's natural resources and historical artifacts.





COLUMBIA'S "FAMOUS AUTHORS' QUILT" - RAFFLE GRAND PRIZE

In 1980 the Friends of the Library conceived of an ambitious fundraising project combining the goodwill of notable literary talents alongside the Friends' considerable quilting skills. Inspired by the success of a similar project at Mansfield's Congregational Church, Gem Marston, Noreen Steele, Linda Spector, Faye Titus, Lorraine Kammerer, Carol



Kubala, and Sue Russo formed the core stitching --- quilting team aided by many other Columbia residents and Friends. The project concluded the day the raffle, December 5, 1984 at 7 p.m. Raffle tickets sold for \$1.00.



Fast forward to October 7, 2022, to an inquiry from Connecticut resident Ms. Lisa Preli. "Hello, I am trying to research a quilt that was made by the Saxton B. Little Library. I know it is a needle in a haystack, but I was hoping you could confirm that the signatures are real. Any help would be greatly appreciated."

Ms. Preli's photographs revealed the embroidered name Saxton B. Little and dates 1883 – 1983 which framed 48 squares, each containing a celebrated

author's embroidered signature. Their names were familiar to most everyone from 1960 – 1990. John Updike, James Michner, Herman Wouk, Theodore White, Alister Cooke, Dr. Suess, Richard Scary, Irving Wallace, Adelma Grenier Simmons, George M. Schulz, Erma Bombeck, Allen Ginsberg, James Baldwin, Michael Creighton, Bruce Clements, Erich Segal, Sylvia Porter, Peg Bracken, and thirty others supported Columbia's library fundraiser.
