As we celebrate Independence Day this Fourth of July we ask that you celebrate without fireworks. As many of you know, we have an adult pair of American Bald Eagles (Bertha &

Harry) nesting near Columbia Lake and they have successfully hatched an eaglet named Henley.

Henley is still in a critical stage of his/her growth. As fledglings they will remain in the nest for four or five weeks, taking short flights while their primary feathers grow and strengthen. Bertha and Harry will still provide the eaglet with food, but the eaglet will start learning how to hunt for their own food in late July through October.

explains that "Loud, prolonged, and unpredictable noises


like fireworks can cause young to leave the nest before

they are able to fly, often leading to the bird's death. To avoid harm to nesting eagles from fireworks, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service published guidelines recommending measures including a half mile restrictive buffer. The ultimate intent of these guidelines is to limit harm to eagles."

The letter from CTDEEP will be distributed to residents around Columbia Lake. We have confirmed that sparklers and fountains that can be purchased legally may be enjoyed at any time. Any other forms of fireworks is illegal in Connecticut.

We wish you a safe and happy 4th of July and would like to thank you for your help in protecting our nesting eagles.

EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT

WHAT IS IT?

The Emergency Broadband Benefit is a temporary FCC program to help households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic.

The benefit provides:

- Up to \$50/month discount for broadband services;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands; and
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet purchased through a participating provider.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

A household is eligible if one member of the household:

- Has an income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guide lines or participates in certain government assistance programs;
- Receives benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch or breakfast program;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS: Transfer Station stickers can be purchased online on the **Reckdesk** page or at the Town Clerks Office.

The standard permit price (2 stickers) is \$40 per household for non-seniors and \$20 per household for seniors (62 and over). Up to 2 additional stickers may be purchased at \$20 each.

FIRE MARSHAL: OPEN BURNING - The Town of Columbia allows campfires and the burning of brush. Both are governed by the State of Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) regulations and town ordinance 15-8. These regulations and guidelines can be found on-line at **CT.GOV** website or the **Town's website**.

Campfire Safety

- No permit is required, but follow safety guidelines.
- Campfires should not be larger the 3 feet in diameter.
- Burn tree wood only.

Brush Burning

- A permit is required.
- Do not burn to clear land.
- Brush should be 3 inches in diameter or less.
- Burn piles should not exceed 10 feet in diameter or height.

Safety Tips for All Fires

- If the smoke affects your neighbors, find a different location to burn.
- Have a 5-gallon bucket of water and a metal rake available, if needed.
- No burning of garbage, furniture, tires, manufactured lumber, stumps, or hazardous materials.
- Do not place fire under electrical lines, the smoke can be a conductor.
- Always burn safely and never leave a fire unattended.

TAX OFFICE: Property taxes on the Grand List of 10/1/20 will become due and payable July 1, 2021. Real estate and personal property taxes (other than registered motor vehicles) may be paid in two installments if the total tax due is over \$250.00. The second installment of these taxes will become due Jan 1, 2022.

All Motor Vehicle tax, the first installment of Real Estate and Personal Property tax will become delinquent on August 3, 2021. Mail must be postmarked on or before August 2, 2021, to be considered paid on time.

If taxes are not paid on or before Aug 2, 2021, interest is charged at the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ % per month (18% per year) from the due date of July 1st. The minimum interest charged is \$2.00 (per vehicle). Failure to receive a bill does not invalidate the tax or interest per CT State Statute.

Taxes may be paid by mail or put in one of the drop boxes outside of the Town Hall; or

online via www.columbiact.org and service fees apply. The Tax Collector's office hours in the Town Hall, 323 RT 87 Columbia in July & Aug 2nd, MON through WED 8AM to 4PM, THURS 10AM to 6PM and FRI 8AM to 12PM.

Tax bills will be mailed on June 29, 2021 and will be available online on July 1, 2021.

DOG LICENSING

JUNE began dog licensing month. The license year for your dog runs from July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022.

TOWN CLERKS OFFICE CONTINUED: When licensing your dog, if their rabies vaccination has expired, please provide us with a copy of their current rabies vaccination certificate. If your dog has been spayed or neutered, include a copy of the veterinarian's certificate as well.

Please note: If you are licensing your dog(s) in July, there is now a \$1.00 late fee per dog.

BEACH PASSES can be purchased online using this <u>link</u>.

- Family maximum = \$120 per household, EXCLUDING ALL OTHER passes. (<u>If purchasing</u> online email at <u>recdirector@columbiact.org</u> and an invoice will be emailed to you)
- Passes are required for admission for each person age 5 and over.
- Proof of age required for resident senior citizens (age 62 and over).
- Guests must be accompanied by pass holder at all times.
- Residents may purchase a day pass at \$5 per day per resident, ages 5 and over.
- Fishermen using the town dock must have a beach pass.
- Transferable guest passes are \$40, up to a limit of 4.



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COLUMBIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT: The Columbia Volunteer Fire Department is led by officers whose expertise, experience and dedication to the work of a volunteer fire service is at the heart of what makes the department run smoothly and successfully. The CVFD's Lieutenants include five members who bring varied skills to their roles.

Lieutenant Brian Dunn is a lifelong resident of Columbia and currently lives in town with his family. He has been a member of the CVFD since November, 2002 and is certified as an EMT, Firefighter 1, Firefighter 2, and Fire Instructor 1. Brian is a Systems Engineer at IT Direct in West Hartford and when he is not working, at the station or caring for his young children, he enjoys exploring photography. Brian's work at the CVFD is based on his desire to be part of something bigger than himself and to give back to the community.

Fred Vanston has been a CVFD member since January, 2008 and holds the office of Member-At-Large as well as the position of Lieutenant. Since January, 2020, Fred has been employed as a full-time firefighter in Mansfield; he holds certifications as an EMT, Instructor 1, and has been trained in Cold Water Rescue, Hazmat Operations, and trained as a firefighter at the Connecticut Fire Academy. Fred comes from a long line of firefighters and after earning a Bachelors Degree in Civil Engineering from UMass Amherst, Freed moved to Columbia in 2007. Unbeknownst to him, the town had a Volunteer Fire Department and Fred quickly became a member and began to pursue his interest in servicing others through his membership.

Lieutenant Tom Doyle joined the CVFD in April 2012 and is certified as an EMT and an EMS-Instructor and completed his Q License training to drive fire apparatus. Tom joined the department in an effort to help others and to give back to his community. Tom holds the elected position of President of The Columbia Volunteer Fire Department, overseeing administrative activities within the CVFD. Tom has taught at Horace W. Porter School for 14 years, has coached recreational sports in town and served as President of the Little League.

COLUMBIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT CONTINUED:

Kara Bowen has lived in Columbia since 1992 and joined the CVFD in April, 2015. Aside from her appointed position as a Lieutenant, she holds the elected office as the CVFD's Treasurer. Kara has earned her certification as an EMT, Firefighter 1, Firefighter 2 and has received her Q License. Kara holds a Bachelors Degree in Accounting and joined the department when she was a stay-at home mom to her now 13 year old son. Kara is grateful for the opportunity to serve the community and to a member of dedicated group at the CVFD.

AHM: AHM's Executive Director, Tressa Giordano recently shared; "we are thrilled to once again offer in-person programs for local children, youth, young adults, families, and seniors. We have building improvements in place at AHM's Community Center to create a Covid-Safe environment for all ages. As we move through the summer, more services and events are being added to the schedule."

Mental Health Services: In addition to all of AHM's school-based mental health services, AHM's Clinical Director Megan Aldridge also shares: "While our outpatient clinical services have been available virtually throughout this past year, we are excited to add in-person options for children, young adults, and families. 

However, it was The Trust For Public Land (TPL), a national organization with a Connecticut field office since 1986, that made all the difference. TPL provided the professional expertise that Columbia lacks to accomplish the real estate negotiations, mapping, appraisals, surveys, legal services, and grant writing services. AWARDS ~ The categories to be judged will be 'Best Representing the Theme', 'Most Decorated' and 'Most Spirited'. Judges are strategically placed around the lake to determine award winners. Again, go at steerage speed and stay in the parade until we arrive back close to the dam to ensure all judges view your boat!

MADE IN LEBANON-CRANK: THE STORY OF THE NEWCOMB FAMILY CHEST

One of the frustrations of a local historical society is the difficulty in acquiring early furniture made by someone in the society's area of interest. The chest-on-chest in the Lebanon Historical Society's new exhibit, Made in Lebanon, is one of a few Lebanon examples of early furniture in their collection.

The chest is made of cherry and birch in a "high rural style" relating to furniture made in Colchester and Norwich. The secondary woods are chestnut, poplar and pine. It stands nearly 7 feet tall and 44" wide. While it has had damage to drawer edges, a replaced flame finial and finish, it is in excellent overall condition. It must have been quite impressive in the farmhouse in Lebanon Crank.

The chest was made sometime between 1760 and 1779, most probably by Peter Newcomb. At that time, the Newcomb family home was near the intersection of the roads to Windham and Hartford, now Rts 6 and 66. Peter was the second of three generations of Lebanon joiners [furniture]




makers]. He had inherited tools from his father and passed his own to his son, William. Peter's will also gave this chest to his daughter Jemima in 1779.

In an 18th century rural estate, a good bed and its furnishings was usually the most valuable furniture. However, this chest was listed at 20% more than the best bed.

Jemima married a Capt. Gideon Clark of Lebanon 1787 and this chest continued by marriage through the Clark, Isham and Gilette families to the late 20th Century.

The Lebanon Historical Society Museum has many interesting exhibits and is open year 'round, Wed.—Sat. from 12pm to 4pm. The Museum is open to the public, offers free admission, and is handicapped accessible. www.historyoflebanon.org.

NORMAN P. LITTLE'S BASKETSHOP FACTORY

What happened to Norman P. Little's Basketshop "factory" formerly on Basketshop Road near West Street? As a young man Norman P. Little (1833 – 1915) learned the ash splint weaving techniques from neighboring Indigenous families. He may have even learned the craft from members of the extended Buck family of Chestnut Hill, once prominent among skilled basket makers in Eastern Connecticut. He too became an accomplished basket maker, so much so, that in 1857 he was asked to teach the craft as a guest instructor at a Rhode Island trade school. By 1862 Norman P. Little started a home business eventually employing 18 men who worked the trade in a two-story red frame building which once stood on Basketshop Road. From 1862 to 1910 this enterprise produced countless sturdy ash and oak splint baskets with interwoven oak wood handles --- made from local lumber. The cutting and processing of wooden splints was semi-mechanized using re-purposed machinery from a water-powered mill. The finished baskets were transported by horse and wagon to Hartford and the Hop River Railroad Station where they were conveyed by rail to regional cities.

NORMAN P. LITTLE'S BASKETSHOP FACTORY (CONTINUED)

In 1910 Norman P. Little sold his company to one of his craftsmen, Abraham Lavietes of Shelton, Connecticut, who by 1911 had invested in a brandnew factory sited next to the Shelton railway called the Shelton Basket Company. The Shelton Historical Society states that Abraham Lavietes continued to manufacture according to Little's designs for sturdy, high-quality, interwoven wooden splint baskets of ash and oak. These industrial baskets were for "heavyduty material handling" including: potato picking farms of Long Island, oyster-growing fisheries of



Long Island sound, mushroom growers of Kennett Square, Pennsylvania, and asparagus growers of New Rochelle, Illinois. Other types of wooden splint hand-crafted baskets were sold to commercial laundries, designed for elegant railroad dining cars, grocery and meat markets, and chain-store shopping. Lavietes and his son Ray expanded the product line for sports vending in a special arrangement with Harry M. Stevens, America's foremost concessionaire (inventor of the ball park hot dog) who owned concessions at major baseball parks and race tracks from Maine to New Orleans.

In time, the Lavietes family expanded into new product lines for household use, such as laundry, kitchen bread, picnic, pie, flower and garden baskets, and specialty baskets for bicycles, ladies' handbags, and for cosmetics sales. According to the Shelton Historical Society, the Shelton Basket Company was well known as "the Tiffany of the basket industry" for their high-quality, hand-woven, beautiful oak and ash products.

As newer, cheaper wire and plastic products began to be mass-produced after WWII, wooden splint baskets fell out of favor. Mechanization in agricultural harvesting made manual picking obsolete. Ash and oak lumber, once readily available in Connecticut, became harder to find. And so, in 1960 Ron Lavietes sold the Shelton Basket Company to the Chippewa Indian Reservation of Hayward, Wisconsin who continued to craft baskets in the traditional way.
