

As we celebrate Independence Day this
Fourth of July we ask that you celebrate
without fireworks. As many of you know, we
have an adult pair of American Bald Eagles
(Bertha & Harry) nesting near Columbia
Lake and they have successfully hatched
one eaglet that we are affectionately calling
Lubov.

Lubov is still in a critical stage of his growth.

As a fledgling Lubov will remain in the nest
for four or five weeks, taking short flights

while his primary feathers grow and strengthen. Bertha and Harry will still provide the eaglet with food, but the eaglet will start learning how to hunt for his own food in late July through October. Brian Hess, Wildlife Biologist with CT-DEEP explains that "Loud, prolonged, and unpredictable noises like fireworks can cause young to leave the nest before they are able to fly, often leading to the bird's death. To avoid harm to nesting eagles from fireworks, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service published guidelines recommending measures including a half mile restrictive buffer. The ultimate intent of these guidelines is to limit harm to eagles."

The Board of Selectman has authorized the distribution of a letter to residents around Columbia Lake by Hess. We have confirmed that sparklers and fountains that can be purchased legally may be enjoyed at any time. Any other forms of fireworks is illegal in Connecticut.

We wish you a safe and happy 4th of July and would like to thank you for your help in protecting our nesting eagles.

RECREATION PARK: The improvements to Rec Park are reaching completion and we will be hosting a Rec Park Celebration highlighting the various new projects that have been completed on August 6th from 12-2 with food, music and games. ASSESSORS OFFICE:

Motor Vehicle Adjustments: In order to have a motor vehicle bill adjusted we need two forms of proof. The first is a copy of the vehicle plate return receipt that you get from DMV when you return your plates. The second is something that shows how you disposed of the vehicle. Accepted proofs are a copy of the bill of sale, an out-of-state registration, an insurance statement that specifically states your vehicle was removed for sale or because it was sold, stolen, or totaled. You can also submit a junked vehicle statement from the junkyard or a copy of your purchase agreement if you traded in a vehicle and bought a vehicle with a lower value

Renters Program: The Renters Program runs until October 1st so please call us or come in if you are interested in this program. You must be 65 or older or totally disabled. Please call us to find out what is necessary to file an application, or you can go to our website at www.columbiact.org under the Elderly & Totally Disabled Benefits line item for further information.

BUILDING AND LAND USE DEPARTMENT: We are happy to announce the arrival of our new **on-line permitting system** for the submittal of applications for most building, electrical, plumbing, mechanical/HVAC, fuel/gas and demolition permits.



For your convenience, multiple forms of payment are accepted in the on-line system. A 3% fee will be applied to credit card transactions. Applicants can also visit us with cash or check payments during our normal business hours, by postal mail, or by using the drop box located to the left of our Yeoman's Hall entrance. Please keep in mind that applications cannot be processed without payment.

Before applying for a permit, you should review the Building Department portion of the website to see what documentation may be required.

Paper permit applications will continue to be accepted in the office, by mail, or by drop box with a cash or check payment only, however we do encourage the use of our new on-line system.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION AHEAD

The milling and paving of Cards Mill Road will begin the week of July 11. Milling and paving will be conducted on Cards Mill Road between the intersection with Rt. 66 East and Baker Hill Road. Please expect periodic road closures and delays between July 11th through the 15th. Work will be performed between the hours of 6:30 am and 5:00 pm. Please seek alternative routes if possible.

MARINE PATROL: The mission of the Marine Patrol Unit 's goal is to promote safety for recreational boating on Columbia Lake by conducting regular safety inspections of recreational vessels. Inspections are completed to ensure proper safety equipment, compliance with boating regulations and licensing and to educate boaters while promoting safety on the water. The Marine Patrol is observant of boating violations that hold the potential to cause a hazard or danger to others using the water.

The Marine Patrol is comprised of Gate Monitoring and Boat Patrol. Gate Monitoring consists of Qualified Town of Columbia (TOC) Inspectors that examine watercraft, trailer and towing vehicles (including rollers and bunks) for any signs of vegetation, mussels, snails or standing water. Inspection includes opening and checking internal compartments to

The Marine Patrol is on duty: weekends from 11:00 am to 8:30 pm and on weekdays 5:00 pm to 8:30 pm.

ensure they are completely drained as AIS can be easily transported in standing water from previous boat use. If no signs of AIS are seen or felt and no standing water has been found, the watercraft can be launched. The Marine Patrol consists of Marine Patrol Officers who regulate the operation of motorboats, water-skiing and other water activities on Columbia Lake to ensure the comfort and safety of the public and the protection of the property.

MARINE PATROL CONTINUED: Gate monitoring is enforced at the boat launch, located at Columbia Town Beach, during the stated hours. Prior to launching a watercraft, it is inspected for the presence of Aquatic Invasive Species, pursuant to the Inspection Procedures in accordance with Town of Columbia Town Ordinance 6-4. Inspection of watercraft is completed by Qualified TOC Inspectors.

To launch a watercraft at the Town of Columbia Boat Launch, the watercraft needs to be registered to a resident of the Town of Columbia. Registration, proof of residence and a boating license are required upon the initial inspection of a watercraft.







TAX OFFICE: Tax bills for the 2021 Grand List will be mailed at the end of June 2022 with a due date of July 1, 2022. The last day to pay without a penalty will be Monday August 1, 2022. Bills will be available on-line on July 1, 2022. By law this office uses the postmark as the payment date.

You can view and pay your tax bills on-line; Go to www.columbiact.org and click on the Pay Taxes
On-line tab on the home page. On the next page click



on the View/Pay button (square) to go to a search screen. Type your last name, space, first initial of your first name (as is written on the bill). The service fee for on-line payments are as follows: 95 cents to use a Bank account and 2.95% for credit and debit cards.

TAX OFFICE CONTINUED: Regular office hours for the <u>TAX OFFICE</u>: Monday through Wednesday 8:00-2:00, Thursday 10:00-6:00 and closed on Friday. *The Tax Office has* extended hours in July and August 1, 2022: Monday through Wednesday 8:00-4:00, Thursday 10:00-6:00 and Friday 8:00-12:00.

Drop boxes for payments and correspondence are located at the right side of the entrance of the Town Hall and in front of Yeoman's Hall. The drop boxes are emptied at 8:00AM each weekday, weekend tax payments are processed on Monday. Please be aware that tax payments put in the drop box after 8:00AM will be processed the next day the Tax Office is open.

For those seeking an immediate clearance for DMV due to delinquent taxes please contact the Tax Office at 860-228-0230 or taxcollector@columbiact.org for information on the process. Paying the tax bill on-line does not clear you immediately at DMV. You will need to contact the tax office during the tax office hours for assistance.

TOWN CLERKS OFFICE: The Town Clerk's office is fully open to the public – no appointment necessary. We are here for those services you might need – Recording and Searching of Land Records, Dog Licenses, Transfer Station stickers, Certified copies of Vital Records, Marriage licenses, Fishing and Hunting licenses, etc.

JUNE began dog licensing month. **The license year for your dog runs from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023.** When licensing your dog, if their rabies vaccination has expired, please provide us with a copy of their current rabies vaccination certificate. If your dog has been spayed or neutered, include a copy of the veterinarian's certificate as well.

Please note: If you are licensing your dog(s) in July, there is now a \$1.00 late fee per dog.

TOWN HISTORIAN: The 59th Annual Columbia Lion's Club 4th of July Parade

"We love a parade...and Columbia's was the best...a five-star parade for the fourth...delighting hundreds of spectators" according to the Chronicle, Willimantic, Conn., Friday, July 5, 1985, Suburban section's full-page spread. Photographer Harold Hanka captured the gleeful spirit.

This year's 59th Annual Columbia Lion's Club 4th of July Parade is themed "Helping One Another". It is scheduled for Monday, July 4, 2022, at 10:00 am according to organizer Mr. Jim Blair.

This tradition, according to the late Marge Grant, hails back to a dark time in our country's mood, caused by the Berlin Crisis and Cuban Missile Crisis during 1961-1962, when Columbia Lion's Club President Howard Bates is said to have felt that patriotism was at an all-time low. He was determined, according to Marge, to uplift the spirits of our town by focusing on the positive, thus suggested among other projects, an "old-fashioned hometown parade" to

celebrate our nation's founding on July 4, 1776.

Since 1962 the Lion's Club and Town of Columbia have jointly sponsored a traditional hometown parade which has grown to include many local communities and thousands of spectators. But in 2020 the parade was canceled due to the coronavirus pandemic. Columbia Congregational Church quickly stepped in to creatively host a spirited "Honkin' Hello" car-only parade showcasing our town's civic organizations in all neighborhoods.

This year's theme "Helping One Another" was selected through a contest which included Horace W. Porter School students and is consistent with the Lion's Club motto and philosophy "We Serve". The Columbia Lion's Club was organized on



August 13, 1955, with 21 charter members and has served to improve our town in many ways involving youth projects, recreation infrastructure, landscaping, cultural enjoyment, safety, philanthropy, and numerous civic projects that have helped individuals in countless ways since 1955.

As someone said to me recently "the joy of the full parade is back"! Ingrid Wood, Town Historian



CONSERVATION AND AGRICULTURE COMMISSION:

What is the Value of Open Space?

Why do we need to conserve Open Space? To nature lovers the answer is obvious, but to others it may not be such a no-brainer. Let's look at some reasons why it is so important to our community to have Open Space.

Mental and Physical Health: Remember how you felt during the Covid Pandemic when everything was shut down? There was nowhere to go, but you just had to get out of the house? Record numbers of people turned to the out-of-doors for mental and physical well-being. State Parks, Rail Trails, hiking trails, Land Trust Properties, and outdoor recreation areas had visitors like never before! Imagine what it would have been like if we hadn't had all these outdoor places to which we could go to achieve some exercise and peace of mind.



Economic Sustainability: Residential development costs towns more in goods and services than generated taxes cover. Farmland and open space generate less tax revenue than residential, commercial, or industrial property, but they require little infrastructure costs and maintenance.

CONSERVATION AND AGRICULTURE COMMISSION CONTINUED:

According to The Land Trust Alliance in a recent study (Saving Land, Spring, 2015) covering 25 States, for every dollar of tax revenue raised, it costs a town \$0.30 in services for commercial and industrial lands; \$0.37 for open space and agricultural lands; \$1.16 for residential lands.

Why? Cows don't go to school; and residential areas require constant maintenance for infrastructure as well as children to educate. Open Space is a bargain. Not only that, proximity to open space increases the value of residential property.

Cultural Legacy: In Columbia's Plan of Conservation and Development, one of the major goals identified by the people of our town was maintaining the small-town character of Columbia. People do not love our town for its proximity to shopping and big-box stores. They love it for the forests, Lake, stonewalls, open fields and recreation. Open Space protects all that. Open Space helps to preserve our history: The Wells Woods "Ghost Town," the Hop River Village; the Mill ruins on the rivers and streams. Without Open Space these would have been obliterated by development.

Biological/Ecological Sustainability: Open Space maintains the stability and resilience of biological and physical systems. Forests maintain water quality by filtering pollutants in runoff and recharging groundwater. The protected Open Space in the watershed of Columbia Lake is a major reason why our Lake is so clean and clear. Everyone in Columbia has a residential well. Without forests to filter and recharge those wells, we would be experiencing enormous tax increases to provide a public water system.

Unfragmented forests protect biological diversity, and sequester and store carbon to mitigate climate change.

Open Space is important to our community. 
