

In late September, Columbia resident Russell Inzinga was presented a Congressional Gold Medal from Rep. Joe Courtney for his service during WWII as a U. S. Merchant Marine. During WWII, the U.S. Merchant Mariners provided crucial services to the U. S. Military and our allies. Russell joined the Merchant Marines in 1942 and served aboard the E. B. Alexander. If you are wondering why Russell did not receive the Congressional Gold Medal until now, it is because unfortunately the Merchant Marines were not provided with the same benefits or recognition as other veterans when they returned home from the war. In 2020, Congress passed the Merchant Mariners of World War II Congressional Gold Medal Act. Russell will be turning 101 in November, and I would like to thank him for his service. I am pleased that he has finally received the Congressional Gold Medal for serving his country with honor and bravery.

With summer ending the projects at Rec Park are at completion or entering the final phases. The pavilion is now complete with concession stand, handicap bathrooms, and storage for the Recreation Department, Little League, and the Soccer League. Rental of the new pavilion is now available. Disc golf will be completed soon with a family focus from beginners to intermediate levels. The new maintenance garage is complete and will house all our equipment which will be easily assessable to our public works crew. The guardrail installation project in front of the softball field is now complete.

In celebration we will be hosting a Rec Park Celebration highlighting the various new projects that have been completed on October 22nd at Rec Park from 12-2 with food, music, and games. We hope you will join us!

Tristan Kandolin has worked for the Town part time at the Transfer Station and as a seasonal maintainer. He was recently promoted to a full-time highway maintainer this past




spring. Tristan has transitioned very well as a full-time employee and is dedicated to maintaining Rec Park to the highest standard.

season and beyond to households and families who need it.

Beginning last week, applications opened for this winter. Anyone who thinks they may qualify can apply online or by visiting or contacting your local Community Action Agency. It's important to note there is no longer an asset test to determine eligibility for LIHEAP –

instead, eligibility is only determined by income. This change started last winter and it is a major improvement to the program. It's also important to remember that even if you've received support through LIHEAP in previous years, you still need to reapply for this season.

Columbia's R U OK Program: The Beckish Senior Center is starting the R U OK Program. It is a FREE service that establishes a prearranged time for participants to receive a regular phone call inquiring about their welfare. This program is to keep seniors who prefer to live independently safe and to provide them with the added security of being monitored for safety. During the call participants are asked "Are You OK?" If they answer "yes" they may simply hang up and continue with their day. If a concern is expressed, the volunteer caller will determine the nature of the concern and if some sort of response is necessary. Unanswered

BECKISH SENIOR CENTER Continued: calls or busy signals are called back. If there is still no response after a preselected number of missed calls, the volunteer caller may request that an officer be dispatched to the location for a safety check.

Select a day of the week and time you would like to be called. We have many local volunteers in Columbia to help with this new program, and we are looking forward to getting it started. BUILDING/LAND USE DEPARTMENT: We are happy to announce the arrival of our new online permitting system for the submittal of applications for most building, electrical, plumbing, mechanical/hvac, fuel/gas and demolition permits. For your convenience, multiple forms of payment are accepted in the online system. A 3% fee will be applied to credit card transactions. Applicants can also visit us with cash or check payments during our normal business hours, by postal mail, or by using the drop box located to the left of our Yeomans Hall entrance. Please keep in mind that applications can not be processed without payment.

Before applying for a permit, you should review the Building Department portion of the website to see what documentation may be required.

Paper permit applications will continue to be accepted in the office, by mail, or by drop box with a cash or check payment only, however we do encourage the use of our new online system.

FIRE MARSHAL: Fire Prevention week was October 9-15, hopefully you were able to spend time talking about fire safety in your home, place of business or at school. The fall is a good time to upgrade your smoke and CO detectors and to discuss your emergency exit plan, which should include a meeting place outside of the building. Also, if you have a fire, remember to never re-enter the building for any reason.

In the fall we should:

- 1. Take the opportunity to have your homes heating system cleaned and serviced for the upcoming winter.
- 2. Clear combustible materials a minimum of 36" away from all heat sources, this helps reduce the risk of them being ignited.
- 3. Clean and service your wood, pellet or gas stove.
- 4. Reduce electrical extension cord use.
- 5. Check<u>www.nfpa.org</u> for other Fire Prevention Safety Tips.



- Completed Absentee Ballots must be received by 8pm on November 8th. They can be returned via mail, Ballot Drop Box outside Town Hall, or to the Town Clerk's office. Absentee Ballots cannot be accepted at the polling place.

STATE ELECTION

State elections will take place on November 8, 2022. Absentee ballots become available on October 7, 2022 through the close of business on November 7, 2022.

PERMANENT ABSENTEE BALLOTS: An elector with a permanent physical disability, who is unable to appear in person at their poll on Election Day, may file an absentee ballot application along with a doctor's certificate (on letterhead) with the Town Clerk. This will place the elector on the Permanent Absentee Ballot list. A copy will be forwarded to the Registrar of Voters so that the permanent status can be noted on their registration. Throughout the year, for any election, primary or referendum, the Town Clerk will automatically mail an absentee ballot to the elector as soon as they become available. Robert Oxenhorn is an accomplished and important American artist who while capturing the lush New England countryside using shapes created from tonal values and color in some works, also conceives new worlds of color and movement in his brilliant abstract pieces. Whatever he's working on, Robert exhibits a love for the subjects he paints. Born in Manchester Connecticut in 1943, Robert grew up in Hartford, Connecticut. Oxenhorn graduated from Hartford Art School of the University of Hartford with a bachelor's degree in Fine Art and Design. He earned early recognition for his works by winning numerous regional and national competitive exhibitions. In 1966, after service in the US Army, Robert became a graphic designer and illustrator. He designed and illustrated for numerous companies including The

Hartford Insurance Group, The Aetna Insurance Company, American Optical Corporation, Spalding Sports International, Holyoke Water Power Company, and Northeast Utilities now known as Eversource, and various other organizations and businesses. Much of his work is published nationally. In 2001, Robert took a hiatus from the commercial art scene and entered many newly created fine art pieces into multiple art shows throughout Connecticut. The Mystic Museum of Art, The Wadsworth Athenaeum, Lyme Art Association, Slater Museum, and The Hygienic Art Gallery are some of the organizations where Robert's artwork has been displayed. Numerous collectors and corporations hold artworks by Robert Oxenhorn, nationwide.


