REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
COLUMBIA BOARD OF SELECTMEN
Tuesday, November 17, 2015 - 7 pm.
Adella G. Urban Administrative Offices Conference Room
323 Route 87, Columbia, CT

Members Present: First Selectman Carmen Vance, Deputy Selectman Steven Everett, Selectman William O'Brien, Selectman Robert Hellstrom, Selectman Robert Bogue.

Also Present: Town Administrator Natasha Nau, Ann Dunnack, Corey Sipe (reporter – *The Chronicle*).

CALL TO ORDER: C. Vance called the meeting to order at 7 pm.

1. **PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.
2. **MINUTES: BOS Regular meeting minutes of November 4, 2015:** R. Bogue MOVED to approve the 11/4/15 minutes as presented. MOTION CARRIED 5:0.
3. **AUDIENCE OF CITIZENS:** None.
4. **OLD BUSINESS:** None.
5. **NEW BUSINESS:**
 - 5.1 **DEEP Resolution for Recycling Initiative Grant receipt:** N. Nau stated that she had applied for \$5,000 and was awarded \$4,750. Once this is signed work on composting and green products may begin. R. Bogue MOVED to authorize C. Vance to sign the DEEP Resolution for Recycling Initiative Grant as presented. MOTION CARRIED 5:0.
 - 5.2 **Saxton B. Little Free Library Expansion Project – Certified Payroll Services Proposal:** N. Nau reviewed a proposal from Nathan L. Jacobson Engineers to perform the certified payroll services involved with the Saxton B. Little Free Library Expansion and Renovation Project. N. Nau explained that the contractor, Millenium Builders, has approximately 13 subcontractors. She stated that she feels performing the certified payroll services in house would take up a large portion of time. N. Nau also pointed out that she would feel more comfortable contracting these services out to ensure it is done accurately for liability purposes. S. Everett questioned why these services fall under the town's responsibility instead of the state. Discussion followed. N. Nau will look into this and bring an answer back to the Board. This ITEM has been TABLED.

W. O'Brien would like to see proposals regarding work at the beach to correct the erosion issue as soon as they are available.

Discussion ensued regarding the intersection at Route 66 and West St. / Hunt Rd. R. Hellstrom feels that the trees at the intersection are an issue and should be cut down. S. Everett does not feel the trees are an issue however they may pose a sight line issue for

individuals traveling towards Hebron on Route 66 if they were to pass someone on the right hand side that is turning left on to Hunt Road. Discussion followed. W. O'Brien would be willing to hear alternative solutions to correcting this problem other than taking trees down. R. Bogue agreed. Discussion followed. C. Vance MOVED to leave the trees at the intersection near Route 66 and West St. / Hunt Rd. as they are. MOTION CARRIED 3:2:0 with C. Vance, W. O'Brien, R. Bogue in favor and R. Hellstrom and S. Everett opposed.

CONA SURVEY AT A GLANCE: As it relates to the areas of transportation and isolation

Using data collected and analyzed from the CONA survey, after collecting transportation options available in surrounding towns and reviewing WRTD data, the Commission on Aging is making the following requests of the Board of Selectmen and the Town Administrator:

1. Apply for a 53-10 Grant to purchase a van to provide flexible, reliable and affordable transportation for seniors and disabled adults in Columbia. (Deadline for application is April, 2016). This van would SUPPLEMENT WRTD services NOT replace them.
2. Put \$47,052.00 into the Selectmen's Operating Budget for the fiscal year 2016-2017. This amount includes \$20,000.00 for the town's 1/3 cost of the van and \$27,052.00 for operational expenses associated with this new service.
3. Work with the Commission on Aging to get the program up and running.

Problems highlighted by survey results are:

1. WRTD, alone, does not meet the needs of our seniors and adults with disabilities for the following reasons:

Question 5: "What Town is primary care DR located?"

Of 111 responses: 50% were located outside of the WRTD service area, 50% in the WRTD service area.

Question 6" What hospital do you utilize?"

Of 186 responses: 43% were in the WRTD service area, 57% were out of area

** With the changes occurring at Windham Hospital there is every reason to project that the number of people using hospitals outside the WRTD area will increase.

Question 7:"Is finding transportation to your medical appointments a hardship?"

Of 134 respondents: 14% stated yes Many said NOT YET but may need another option in the future when they stop driving.

2. Columbia residents identified transportation and social isolation as problems they experience in Columbia.

Presently our seniors and persons with disabilities rely on WRTD Dial- A Ride transportation services and or family, friends etc. to provide transportation to and from medical appointments, shopping, personal business, nutrition, senior center activities, wellness trips and possibly work. WRTD requires "grouping of rides" whenever possible according to the destination. WRTD may be used for rides anywhere within the "10" town Windham region and operates Monday thru Friday from 8am – 4pm. WRTD brokers 1 person rides outside the "10" town Windham region and clients must pay a \$25.00 fare for the round trip. This can get pretty expensive if you require multiple rides per week for medical treatments like dialysis, radiation etc. It is also difficult for WRTD to accommodate early morning and late afternoon appointments which can last 5 to 6 hours.

A municipal grant, the State Matching Grant along with town funds would provide a transport vehicle that extends the WRTD Dial-A Ride services and hours of operation. It would significantly contribute to the quality of life and independence of our seniors and those with disabilities. They would be able to get to their much needed medical appointments, shop, do personal business, attend educational & recreational programs, get out of their homes and socialize with other people decreasing the isolation so often felt by our seniors and disabled persons.

Let's give our seniors and disabled persons who can no longer drive as a result of a health or financial reason, an option for independent travel beyond the present services provided by WRTD.

*At first glance, looking only at the total number of trips, it appears that ridership with WRTD has increased significantly (more than doubled), comparing 2013-2014 with 2014-2015 data.

However, upon closer review of the percentages associated with each trip purpose it seems that ONLY in the area of WORK has there been a significant increase. All other areas have shown a DECREASE in trips. Transportation needs are NOT being met in other areas.

This data supports CONA's strong belief that WRTD, as the only transportation option, is NOT meeting the needs of the elderly and disabled population in Columbia and that their needs would be better served by providing a supplemental service through the purchase of a Town sponsored van.

WRTD supplied a Fall 2015 Dial-A-Ride Client Survey to Natasha. The survey DOES NOT indicate that the 94 respondents are from Columbia. In addition, tabulations for Question 11: "Overall, how satisfied are you with WRTD's Dial-A-Ride service?", state that 39% were Very Satisfied. That leaves 61% that were Somewhat Satisfied, Somewhat Dissatisfied or Very Dissatisfied. There is clearly room for improvement.

Presentation from Nutmeg Senior Rides

April 2015

*Provides services for seniors and visually impaired 24/7

*Mostly volunteer drives supplement with Paid drives

*Cost...\$1.50-\$2.00 first few miles, then over 15 miles a flat fee of \$25.00 each way.

*They use a software program for scheduling that costs \$250.00 per month.

Lebanon and Andover were 2 towns we contacted about sharing services.

Andover indicated that once we purchased a van they might be interested in coordinating services.

Lebanon has more than it can handle running their program with multiple vehicles and drivers.

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3. Recommended Solutions

A reliable, affordable and flexible transportation option is needed for Columbia seniors and citizens with disabilities. The services provided by WRTD do not cover the needs of many seniors and disabled young adults living in Columbia. For these reasons CONA is recommending that in addition to WRTD, the Town would supplement needed rides with a van and driver/s: four days per week from 8AM to 6PM.

This would require applying for a 53 - 10 State grant; cost share is 1/3 funding by the town and 2/3 funding by the state. The grant is through the DOT and managed regionally by the Council of Governments (COG). The deadline for grant application is April, 2016.

Additional funding in the amount of \$47,052.00 would be added to the 2016-17 budget to cover the additional costs associated with this new service. Without having real numbers for riders and trips it is difficult to provide an actual dollar amount for costs. Using data taken from transportation budgets for Andover: \$17,500.00 and Lebanon: \$62,045.00 we are estimating the following amounts:

Towns with successful programs have paid drivers instead of volunteers.

Social isolation is a concern among seniors. Reliable weekly transport to the 3 day a week meal program and recreational activities at the Beckish Center would greatly help ease this danger.

WHO

A full time Recreation Director could have an expanded job description and added responsibilities which would serve Columbia's aging population who consider social activities and communal meals a form of recreation.

The Senior Center Director in many area towns handles transport. Along with additional pay, these additional duties could be added to that job description.

Part time staff could be hired to handle all or part of the needs.

WHERE

There is additional space at the Beckish Center and in the Recreation Office that could be utilized to house this position.

Re: Certified Payroll Review Service Alternatives

I contacted 2 engineers (other than Nathan L. Jacobson) and 8 Certified Public Accountants (CPAs) in the surrounding area. Neither engineer contacted does certified payroll reviews. Only 1 of 8 CPAs indicated this is a service they would do, which is CPA Service LLC in Marlborough, CT. The main CPA's hourly rate is \$175 and the assistant is \$55 per hour. The assistant would do the majority of the work and the main CPA would only check his/her work and sign off on it. They will be providing me a quote shortly; however, the ballpark estimate is \$6,010 (1/4 of 70 hours @ \$175 and 3/4 of 70 hours @ \$55). Please keep in mind 70 hours is the maximum that Howard from Nathan L. Jacobson estimated with 1 contractor and 13 subcontractors. It could be much less as he stated in his proposal. Based strictly on the maximum number of hours and hourly rates, it would be more cost effective to have the CPA perform the work if we were to outsource it; either that or do the reviews in-house.

Dear Board,

I followed up on Steve's question: "Why is the Town responsible for paying for the certified payroll review?"

I spoke with George Murphy, Howard Pfrommer (engineer from Nathan L. Jacobson) and the DOL. The contractor is responsible for turning in correct certified payrolls but sometimes that does not happen. It is the duty of the owner of the project (the Town) to enforce and oversee this activity. The Town must ensure that the contractor is not underpaying (or overpaying in rare circumstances) its workers and therefore that the grant is being spent legitimately. There have been a number of court cases and it is usually the contractor who gets sued, however, there have been a few where the Town has as well for not monitoring. Below are excerpts from the law:

The Law requires that contractors under a "public work" contract pay certain of their employees the "prevailing" rate of wages and supplements set for the locality in which the work is performed. Contractors are required to submit to the locality, every 30 days, a certified payroll. The Town is also required to set forth in the contract that the filing of certified payrolls is a condition to the payment of moneys due and owing for work done. It is the Town's responsibility to collect and perform a facial review of the contractor's certified payroll for each project.

"Every contractor and subcontractor shall submit to the Department of Jurisdiction (Contracting Agency), within thirty (30) days after issuance of its first payroll and every thirty (30) days thereafter, a transcript of the original payrolls, subscribed and affirmed as true under penalty and perjury. The Department of Jurisdiction (Contracting Agency) shall collect, review for facial validity, and maintain such payrolls."

I am looking into a more cost-effective way to procure this service. Howard costs about \$130/hour, which is obviously high because it is at an engineer rate. I am trying to find a company that has only this specialty (at a lower hourly rate). The work involved is checking the wages in the payrolls against the most current monthly prevailing wage table as well as performing mathematical calculations to ensure the totals check out. I can get training from the DOL and do the reviews if it comes down to cost.

I will keep you updated early next week.

In accordance with your 11-03-15 e-mail request, we are pleased to submit herewith our proposal for providing State of Connecticut Prevailing Wage Rate certified payroll review services with respect to the subject project.

This proposal is based on the following assumptions:

- A. The general contractor will have approximately 13 subcontractors.
- B. Certified payroll review services will be needed during an assumed 10 month contract time.
- C. Two to three certified payrolls will need to be reviewed each week during the contract time.
- D. We do not need to attend any construction related meetings other than a pre-construction meeting.

Based on our fee of \$1,123 to review 29 certified payrolls over a three month period for the recently completed Baker Hill Road Bridge project in Columbia, and assuming that we review three certified payrolls per week for 10 months for the Library project, we would estimate a fee of: $\$1,123/29 \text{ certified payrolls} \times 3 \text{ certified payrolls/week} \times 4.33 \text{ weeks/month} \times 10 \text{ months} = \$5,030$. Given the difficulty in accurately estimating this fee since we have no way of knowing at this time exactly how many certified payrolls we will need to review each week, and; given our required attendance at the pre-construction meeting, and; given that most of the construction is anticipated to occur in 2016, we recommend that the Town assume a **\$9,000** budget for this work. If this budget needs to be exceeded due to the number of certified payrolls needing to be reviewed or unanticipated difficulties related to this process, we will not exceed this budget amount without Town of Columbia authorization. At my current hourly rate, \$9,000 equates to approximately 70 manhours.

We propose to provide our services and any other services authorized by the Town, on an hourly rate basis plus reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses (with no mark-ups). The fee shall be based on the

Re: Fracking waste disposal/storage/use ordinance

The chemicals in the toxic and radioactive fracking waste cause cancer, neurological problems, liver and kidney damage, respiratory and cardiac problems, rashes and nosebleeds. The methods for disposal/storage of this waste in Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia have been problematic. A statewide moratorium was passed by Connecticut in June 2014 and expires in July 2017. DEEP has been studying the issue and is expected to draft regulations. In researching this topic, I have shared with you that two towns in the state have passed an ordinance banning the storage, disposal and/or usage of fracking waste. These two towns are Washington and Coventry. I consulted with Coventry on how this topic came about and what the process of passing the ordinance was like. Coventry recommended not including the "bid/contract provision" because it is restrictive. Below is a summary comparison of both ordinances components.

Washington Ordinance (3/5/15)

- **Definitions section:** dispose, fluid, gas, oil, hydraulic fracturing, person, radioactive materials, store, transfer, treat and waste from hydraulic fracturing (fracking waste)
- **Ordinance section:**
 - No person may accept, receive, collect, store, treat, transfer or dispose of any waste or fluid
 - No person may sell offer for sale, offer, barter, manufacture distribute or use any products for anti-icing, de-icing, pre-wetting or dust suppression that is derived from or that contains waste
 - The Selectmen's Office is empowered to issue "cease and desist" orders and require remediation if any damage; may impose fines in amounts deemed necessary

Coventry Ordinance (10/01/15)

- **Prohibitions section:** application of natural gas waste or oil waste on any road or property and wastewater treatment facility; storage, disposal, sale, acquisition, handling, treatment and/or processing of waste from natural gas or oil extraction
- **Bid/contract provision:** no materials containing natural gas or oil waste for purchase/acquisition, retention of services to construct/maintain; sworn statement under penalty of perjury
- **Penalties section:** the Town is empowered to issue "cease and desist" orders and require remediation if any damage; may impose fines in amounts deemed necessary
- **Effective date section:** within 10 days of passing shall be sent to newspaper; effective 21st day after publicizing
- **Definitions section:** hydraulic fracturing, natural gas activities, oil extraction activities, natural gas waste, oil waste and application
- **Transportation section:** this ordinance doesn't ban transportation of products within the Town

TOWN OF WASHINGTON

ORDINANCE REGARDING THE STORAGE, DISPOSAL OR USE OF FRACKING WASTE OR ANY DERIVATIVE THEREOF IN THE TOWN OF WASHINGTON, CONNECTICUT.

FOR ENACTEMENT AT THE TOWN MEETING CONVENED FOR MARCH 5, 2015.

I. DEFINITIONS FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS ORDINANCE:

- (1) "Dispose" means the discharge, deposit, injection, dumping, spilling, leaking or placing of any waste into or on any land or water so that such waste, or any constituent of such waste, may enter the environment, be emitted into the air or discharged into any waters within the town;
- (2) "Fluid" means any material or substance that flows or moves whether in semisolid, liquid, sludge, slurry, gas or any other form or state;
- (3) "Gas" means all natural gas, whether hydrocarbon or non-hydrocarbon, including, but not limited to, hydrogen sulfide, helium, carbon dioxide, nitrogen, hydrogen and casinghead gas;
- (4) "Oil" means all petroleum or crude oil that is a naturally-occurring flammable mixture of hydrocarbons found in geological formations.
- (5) "Hydraulic fracturing" means the highly pressurized pumping of water and sand, containing the prescribed level of chemicals (many of which are toxic), through well bores into or under the surface of the ground in order to create fractures in geological formations (including shale deposits) for exploration, development, production or recovery of gas or oil. "Hydraulic fracturing" does not for the purposes of this Ordinance include the drilling or repair of a geothermal water well or any other well drilled or repaired for drinking water purposes;
- (6) "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, association, syndicate, company, trust, corporation, limited liability company, municipality, agency or political or administrative subdivision of the state;

(7) "Radioactive materials" means any material, solid, liquid or gas, including, but not limited to, waste that emits ionizing radiation spontaneously;

(8) "Store" means holding waste for any period of time, be it temporary, intermediate, long term or indefinite.

(9) "Transfer" means to move from one vehicle to another or to move from one mode of transportation to another.

(10) "Treat" means any method, technique or process designed to change the physical, chemical or biological character or composition of any waste, including, but not limited to, the reclaiming or rendering of waste from hydraulic fracturing as suitable for use or reuse; and

(11) "Waste from hydraulic fracturing (fracking waste)" means any wastewater, wastewater solids, fluid, slurry, brine, sludge, drill cuttings or any other substance used for or generated secondarily to the purpose of hydraulic fracturing, including, but not limited to, naturally occurring radioactive materials released by fracturing and the toxic chemicals used that are recovered as part of the flowback process necessary to extract the gas or oil.

II. ORDINANCE

- a) No person may accept, receive, collect, store, treat, transfer or dispose of any waste or fluid from hydraulic fracturing.
- b) No person may sell, offer for sale, offer, barter, manufacture, distribute or use any product for anti-icing, de-icing, pre-wetting or dust suppression that is derived from or that contains waste from hydraulic fracturing.
- c) The Selectmen's Office is empowered to issue "Cease and Desist" orders in case of any infraction. It is further empowered to require remediation of any damage done to any land, road, building, aquifer, well, water course, air quality or other asset, be it public or private, within the Town of Washington. It may impose fines in any amounts it deems necessary to deal with any and all infractions against this ordinance.

DESCRIPTION

HYDRAULIC FRACTURING (FRACKING) & TOXIC FRACKING WASTE

Hydraulic fracturing (fracking) is the process that follows the completion of a deep drilled lateral well (vertical depth and horizontal length average about 7,000 feet each way for a single well). Millions of gallons of highly pressurized, chemically laden water and sand are pumped down the well to force out gas or oil from shale formations. The 40,000 gallons or more of chemicals that are required for each well include carcinogens and toxins such as: lead, uranium, mercury, ethylene glycol, methanol, hydrochloric acid and formaldehyde (there are 600 such chemicals that may be used in the fracking process). The companies engaged in hydraulic fracturing will not reveal the composition of the chemicals they use, stating "these are proprietary formulas that if made public would impair their competitive position".

To retrieve the gas or oil, fracking also produces a very large flowback of fluids and sludge (waste) that return to the surface during the retrieval process. This waste contains many of the toxic chemicals mentioned that are used in the fracking process. The flowback process also picks up naturally occurring contaminants found underground including radioactive materials such as radium 226 that have been released from the rock formations by the fissures created by the fracking process.

The methods used for the disposal or storage of toxic fracking waste in Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia, although regulated, have all proved problematic according to a May 2012 study by the National Resources Defense Council. There is no reason to believe that Connecticut would fare any better or that these toxic and radioactive materials would not be introduced into CT's ecosystem. Yet, companies with large fracking operations in Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia are considering Connecticut as a place to dump huge amounts of toxic fracking waste resulting from their operations.

On June 15, 2014, Governor Malloy signed into law Public act Number 14 – 200 (SB 237) establishing a three – year moratorium on the disposal, storage, or sale of waste produced from hydraulic fracturing. During this period, the head of DEEP has to formulate regulations to govern such activities in a way that protects public health and the environment. Environmentalists are concerned that at the end of this period the cited regulations may be enacted thus permitting the entry of regulated toxic fracking waste into Connecticut.

The position of the Washington environmental Council is that fracking waste because of its toxic nature will be problematic, as cited in the May 2012 study of the National Resources Defense Council, and constitutes an unacceptable threat to public health and the environment. It supports the passage of the ordinance to be voted on at the town meeting on March 5th that would ban the storage, disposal or use of fracking waste or any derivative thereof in the Town of Washington.

Mathematics

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE STORAGE, DISPOSAL, TREATMENT AND/OR
PROCESSING OF WASTE FROM OIL AND GAS EXPLORATION OR EXTRACTION
ACTIVITIES IN THE TOWN OF COVENTRY, CONNECTICUT.

FOR ENACTMENT AT THE TOWN MEETING CONVENEED FOR 10/01/15 date
TBD)

Section 1. Prohibitions

1. The application of natural gas waste or oil waste, whether or not such waste has received Beneficial Use Determination or other approval for use by DEEP (Department of Energy & Environmental Protection) or any other regulatory body, on any road or real property located within the Town for any purpose is prohibited.
2. The introduction of natural gas waste or oil waste into any wastewater treatment facility within or operated by the Town is prohibited.
3. The introduction of natural gas waste or oil waste into any solid waste management facility within or operated by the Town is prohibited.
4. The storage, disposal, sale, acquisition, handling, treatment and/or processing of waste from natural gas or oil extraction is prohibited within the Town.

Section 2. Provision to be included in bids and contracts related to the construction or maintenance of publicly owned and/or maintained roads or real property within the Town.

1. All bids and contracts related to the purchase or acquisition of materials to be used to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town shall include a provision stating that no materials containing natural gas or oil waste shall be provided to the Town.
2. All bids and contracts related to the retention of services to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town shall include a provision stating that no materials containing natural gas or oil waste shall be utilized in providing such a service.
3. The following statement, which shall be a sworn statement under penalty of perjury, shall be included in all bids related to the purchase or acquisition of materials to be used to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town and all bids related to the retention of services to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town:

"We _____ hereby submit a bid for materials, equipment and/or labor for the Town of Coventry. The bid is for bid documents titled _____. We hereby certify under penalty of perjury that no natural gas waste or oil waste will be used by the undersigned bidder or any contractor, sub-contractor, agent or vendor agent in connection with the bid; nor will the undersigned bidder or any sub-contractor, agent or vendor agent thereof apply any natural gas waste or oil waste to any road or real property with the Town of Coventry as a result of the submittal of this bid if selected."

Section 3. Penalties

This Ordinance shall apply to any and all actions occurring on or after the effective date of this ordinance. The Town is empowered to Issue "Cease and Desist" orders in case of any violation of the Prohibitions and Provision stated above in Sections 1 and 2. It is further empowered to require remediation of any damage done to any land, road, building, aquifer, well, water course, air quality or other asset, be it public or private, within the Town of Coventry. It may impose fines in any amounts it deems necessary with any and all infractions against this Ordinance.

Section 4. Effective Date

Within ten (10) days after the final passage of this Ordinance, it shall be published in its entirety in a newspaper having circulation within the town. It shall become effective on the twenty-first (21st) day after such publication following its final passage.

Section 5. Definitions

1. As used in this Ordinance, the term "hydraulic fracturing" shall mean the fracturing of underground rock formations, including shale and non-shale formations, by manmade fluid-driven techniques for the purpose of stimulating oil, natural gas, or other subsurface hydrocarbon production.
2. As used in this Ordinance, the term "natural gas extraction activities" shall mean all geologic or geophysical activities related to the exploration for or extraction of natural gas, including, but not limited to, core and rotary drilling and hydraulic fracturing.
3. As used in this Ordinance, the term "oil extraction activities" shall mean all geologic or geophysical activities related to the exploration for or extraction of oil, including, but not limited, to, core and rotary drilling and hydraulic fracturing.
4. As used in this Ordinance, the term "natural gas waste" shall mean:
 - a. any liquid or solid waste or its constituents that is generated as a result of natural gas extraction activities, which may consist of water, brine, chemicals, naturally occurring radioactive materials, heavy metals, or other contaminants;
 - b. leachate from solid wastes associated with natural gas extraction activities;
 - c. any waste that is generated as a result of or in association with the underground storage of natural gas;
 - d. any waste that is generated as a result of or in association with liquefied petroleum gas well storage operations; and
 - e. any products or byproducts resulting from the treatment, processing, or modification of any of the above wastes.
5. As used in this Ordinance, the term "oil waste" shall mean:
 - a. any liquid or solid waste or its constituents that is generated as a result of oil extraction activities, which may consist of water, brine, chemicals, naturally occurring radioactive materials, heavy metals, or other contaminants;
 - b. leachate from solid wastes associated with oil extraction activities; and
 - c. any products or byproducts resulting from the treatment, processing, or modification of any of the above wastes.

6. As used in this Ordinance, the term "application" shall mean the physical act of placing or spreading natural gas waste or oil waste on any road or real property located within the Town of Coventry.
7. As used in this Ordinance, the term Town shall mean the Town of Coventry.

Section 6. Transportation

Nothing in this Ordinance shall be interpreted to ban the transportation of any product or by-product described herein on any roadway or real property within the Town of Coventry.

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Why Should Connecticut Ban the Importation of Fracking Waste?

Although natural gas burns much cleaner than other fuels, the extraction of it remains extremely problematic. The extraction methods, called *fracking*, are poorly regulated and are causing many serious environmental problems.



In other states where wells have been "fracked," ground water has been contaminated, rivers have been polluted by fracking waste being released into them, and in some instances, people and animals near fracking wells have become sick.

Fracking is a method of extracting natural gas from deep in the ground by injecting a mixture of water, sand and chemicals under high pressure into dense rock formations such as shale, in order to crack the rock and release the gas.

This new drilling technique in shale formations has allowed the gas industry to reach large reserves that were previously considered uneconomical. Unlike traditional vertical fracking, horizontal fracking requires massive amounts of water, sand, and potentially toxic chemicals to unearth the natural gas that lies underneath the shale. Enormous holding ponds or tanks are also needed to store the chemically contaminated waste water that comes back up the hole after wells have been fractured.

Bill McKibben, the noted author and environmentalist writes, "Fracking has caused enormous problems with underground water contamination and aboveground waste disposal - entire streams have been destroyed."

According to a minority staff report released last year by the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Energy and Commerce, more than 650 commonly used fracking products contain chemicals that are "known or possible human carcinogens, regulated under the Safe Drinking Water Act, or listed as hazardous air pollutants." When the fracking fluids come up from the fracking procedures they not only contain toxic chemicals, they also often contain radio active compounds from deep inside the earth.

At present, federal laws do not protect the health of either the environment or people. Connecticut must protect itself from the importation of toxic fracking wastes.



Coventry has become the second town in Connecticut to pass an ordinance banning fracking waste from natural gas or oil drilling and extraction. The town of Washington passed a ban earlier this year.

Jennifer Siskind, local coordinator for the non-profit (<http://www.foodandwaterwatch.org/>) Food and Water Watch (<http://www.foodandwaterwatch.org/>), worked with Coventry to pass the ordinance. "The reason why this is important now for Coventry is that Connecticut has a temporary moratorium that passed 16 months ago," she said. "And the clock is ticking down. If cities and towns want to protect themselves from fracking waste contamination, they need to pass local bans now."

The statewide moratorium bans fracking waste in Connecticut until at least July 2017 while the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection studies the issue. The DEEP is then expected to draft regulations about what, if any, fracking waste can come to Connecticut.

Siskind said that Coventry has taken an important step in protecting its citizens from the dangers associated with fracking waste. "No amount of regulation can prevent the leaks, the spills, the accidents that we already know are occurring in other states," she said.

Fracking is a method of extracting oil and gas from shale rock that requires drilling a well, then pumping it with a mixture of water, chemicals and sand at extremely high pressure. The chemical solution shatters the shale and releases oil and gas that's trapped in the layers of the rock. A significant amount of what goes into the well, however, comes back up to the surface and must be disposed of.

Siskind and others say the chemicals in the waste pose a significant threat to drinking water and public health, mixed with naturally-occurring but toxic materials buried in the ground.

But others argue that if Connecticut is to benefit from less expensive and comparatively clean burning natural gas that's made available by hydraulic fracturing, it's not unreasonable to expect that the state would also bear part of the risks associated with the fracking process.

On November 13, 2015, James Blair (private contractor) submitted an application for permit, on behalf of Ronald and Sharon Young, of 70 Route 87 in Columbia, to replace an existing dock and add a new dock at that location.

On Saturday, November 14, 2015, Karl Then and I, representing the Lake Management Advisory Committee (LMAC), met with Mr. Blair at the subject site. Mr. Blair explained the desire of the property owners to replace the existing dock and add a new dock. The property owners wish to replace the existing 8 foot by 20 foot wooden dock. This dock has a set of wooden stairs accessing the lake on each side of the dock at the existing rock lake edge. According to the Standards for Granting Permission for the Construction of Structures on Columbia Lake (Lake Guidelines), this existing dock and stairs may be replaced in the same location, same configuration and same size.


The property owners also wish to install a new dock, to be located near their northern property line. The new dock is proposed to be 5 feet wide and 20 feet long. The subject property has a lakeside property line in access of 100 feet. This property line dimension exceeds the minimum lake front property line requirement (100 feet) for two docks. There was discussion with Mr. Blair about the proposed location of the new dock and it was explained to him that the new dock must be located no closer than 25 feet from the extended property line. Mr. Blair will submit a revised site plan with the application that will reflect this requirement.

After review, it is the recommendation of LMAC to the Board of Selectmen that this permit be approved and the following conditions should be considered:

1. All work will be accomplished after Lake Drawdown on beginning November 1, 2015 and be completed prior to the lake re-filling March 15, 2016.
2. No power equipment will be allowed on the lake bed.
3. The applicant will insure construction of the new docks will be of sound materials and shall not adversely affect the quality of the Lake water or aquatic life.
4. The replacement of the existing dock shall be in the same location, the same configuration and the same size (8 feet by 20 feet) as the existing dock.
5. The new dock shall be 5 feet wide by 20 feet long. The new dock will be placed no closer (at any point) than twenty five (25) feet to the applicant's extended property line.
6. The applicant will be permitted a maximum of one off-shore structure (raft or mooring) and must meet the Lake Guidelines for such structure.





CVFD Day-Time Staff

CVFD Tower

I spoke with Chief Starkel regarding the proposal from Cirrus Engineering and whether or not the CVFD members can climb the tower and visually inspect it. He will speak to his Board and membership and get back to me soon. He does agree that having another set of eyes examine the entire tower is a good idea. If the tower is considered stable by the radio vendor or whoever inspects it, Peter feels that with other towers in the area, we can continue to operate with our signal as it is.

Bridges/Roads

Pucker Street Bridge replacement was completed on November 13th and only a few punch list items are left to complete (landscaping and rip-rap). One last payment will be made to Coventry in December.

Library

We met with Millennium for a pre-construction meeting on November 24th.
